- Setting: Two students are talking about forgiveness.
- Jordan: So how are you feeling?
- Meagan: Pretty well, I guess.

- Jordan: Sure. No problem. That's what friends do.
- Meagan: I guess I'm still feeling guilty.
- Jordan: I know you apologized, and I know you asked God for forgiveness too.
- Meagan: Then why do I still feel bad?
- Jordan: You went to church last Sunday, didn't you?
- Meagan: Yeah.
- Jordan: If you've been asking God to forgive you all week, didn't you actually hear the words "You are forgiven"?
- Meagan: Well, yeah, I guess the pastor said those words.
- Jordan: There you go. You're forgiven. I remember a devotion I read that says our sins are removed from us as far as the east is from the west. Gone! Jesus forgives you.

DISCUSSION
